In God We Trust

What does this mean?

Is it a slogan, a claim that "we are right," . . . or what? Let's examine and test it.

In Morris, Illinois:

There are "things" going on all around us right now.

This Tuesday things started out normal. But by the end of the morning there was a huge battery fire on the east side of town, with a plume of smoke and the wind blowing chemicals all around. Then we were told to evacuate. Nothing was normal. Many did not have the chance to pack clothes. Others were worried about getting back in for their meds.

What were we to do? Nothing was normal. Where to sleep?

"In God We Trust" and so we went on doing what we had to do and trusting God.

In our personal lives:

Things go wrong in life, and the longer you live the more ways you have seen them go wrong, Conflicts. Finances. Health.

My friend Harry said to me just a few weeks ago, when he was getting ready for surgery, "I look at it this way. I'm going to wake up. If I wake up and see God, I win. If I wake up and see my family, I win. So either way I win."

"In God We Trust"

Facing disease, pandemics & plagues:

Looking back over the last year and a half: We have been scared; restricted; had to learn to wear masks; heard stories of sickness and stories of sickness and death. We have been restricted; told to stay at home; businesses

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were shut down; we sometimes wondered if it was ever going to end; and on and on But, "In God We Trust"

In Faith and Religion:

Churches last year were restricted from meeting together to worship; and when they were allowed to meet, they were told not to sing. Communion was looked at as a special threat; Pastors were focused on as a medical threat and specifically restricted from hospitals, nursing homes, and from the bedside of the dying. Around our nation and the world, we had to figure out how to minister, how to hold congregations together, and how to reach out to the fearful and hurting. But the stories are also all over in our nation and around the world about how unexpectedly, over and over again, new connections formed, and many who had ignored spiritual things began to seek out and want to hear about Jesus. The kingdom of God continues being gathered by God, and we are heading toward the end when all believers in Jesus will gather in living forever.

"In God We Trust"

"In God We Trust" is also our National Motto – What does this mean?

The founding fathers of our country could look back over the many ways things could have failed in the beginning. From that perspective, "In God We Trust" is a confession that we are not noble enough, not moral enough, not wise enough, and entirely not sufficient to establish, run and preserve a free nation. We need God and without Him we would fail very quickly. In military parlance we need Him to "have our six" (have our back). That was the understanding of our nation's founding fathers, and they said it over and over again. From Washington, looking back over the perils of the Revolutionary war, to Ben Franklin saying of the new nation that it is "a republic if you can keep it." They said that our constitution is wholly inadequate for a people without morals or religion. Thomas Jefferson confessed that he feared for his nation when he contemplated that God is a just God. And Abraham Lincoln was not concerned "that God is on our side" but rather that we should be "on God's side."

"In God We Trust" had been around as a saying since the mid-1700's (leading up to the war to gain freedom from England). It came to prominence in the Civil War among the troops fighting to end slavery (when, by the way, it first appeared on some coins). It became our official motto in the 1950's (after WWII's fight against fascism and during the cold war against communism). So it has always been connected with the yearning for freedom.

That raises the question, "Can there be true freedom without God?"

Many in our time are seeking exactly that, freedom without God. They are vocal about it. They say boldly they do not need religion to be moral, do not need God to have a good life, and certainly do not need church, which is just rules and restrictions (as they miss almost all of what church really is).

But with regard to "morality without God" – how many times do we watch and want to say, "And how's that working out for you." Our culture seems to be busy reinventing morality, built on a foundation that is completely shifting and temporary. Again, we want to ask, "And how's that working out for you?"

"In God We Trust" is anything but a slogan of prideful boasting.

In its various parts it is:

- Turning to God in our times of trouble;
- Praying to be corrected when we have gone wrong;
- Trust that He will bless our simple efforts to live a moral life and care for our loved ones;
- Gratitude for the blessings of freedom; and
- Dedication to see freedom grow in our land and for all humanity.

Most Importantly:

We need to say "In God We Trust" when things *are* going right. That is the time when we are tempted to (Continued on page 3)

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The Power of IN PERSON WORSHIP

Pam Meyer, a lay person and life-long member of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Chicago Heights, knows the importance of coming together for worship. Though online worship definitely has its place, Meyer said that over time "church time" can become just like watching a scheduled TV show. The dangers are that people can become easily distracted, perhaps even fast-forwarding through portions of the service they may not like.

Meyer emphasized the importance of a Christian community. "Especially now, when many of our Biblical teachings are under attack, the support of fellow Christians on a very regular basis is critical," she said.

She also pointed out that online services don't allow us to receive the Body and Blood of Christ which is the real presence of Jesus, freely given for our forgiveness, life, salvation, and a public proclamation of His death until He returns. Meyer also stressed how important it is to witness other Christians in action.

"More than ever, society needs to see Christians living as Christians, walking the walk and not just saying we are Christians," she said. "Being surrounded by other faithful Christians allows us to learn how to emulate how Jesus lived his life."

Meyer, who has served in various lay positions for almost forty years, has been blessed with family witnesses to Christ. Her great-grandfather and a cousin were pastors at St. Paul's. Great uncles, cousins, and a brother have also been pastors, and many of her relatives have served as Lutheran school teachers.



"My parents were very active in the church and the parochial school, so they modeled the faith behavior my family practices to this day." said Meyer.
